



From The Desk of the Surgeon

If you have a Combat Veteran in your family and you don't like their moods or behavior around the holidays; please consider these six things:

- 1.) Your combat veteran has served in countries where people are blessed to receive a tattered pair of shoes or have clean water to drink; he/she no longer lives the "first world illusion" and no longer cares that if you buy one play station you can get a second one for fifty percent off. In fact, they find it hard to appreciate any of the gluttonous commercialism and overindulgence that permeates American holidays. Standing watch, boring as it was, had so much more purpose than going to the mall.
- 2.) Your Combat Veteran is thankful for the most basic things; not thankful for mega-sales and million dollar parades. They are thankful to be alive; thankful to have survived both the wars far away and the wars they struggle with

inside.

- 3.) Your Combat Veteran is thankful that it wasn't them that got killed, or wishes that it was them that got killed instead, or is torn painfully between the two. Either way, their celebrations are forever complicated by guilt and loss over those that died. Some of the most thankful times in their life (lucky to be alive) were some of the scariest. Their feelings of thanks and celebration often conjure up memories that are equally painful.
- 4.) Your Combat Veteran is not like you anymore. At some point, for some period of time, their entire life boiled down to just three simple things: when will I eat today, when will I sleep today, and who will I have to kill or will try to kill me today?
- 5.) Your Combat Veteran does not need a guilt-trip or a lecture; they already feel detached in their grief while others so easily embrace the joy of the season. They need understanding and space; empathy not sympathy.
- 6.) Your Combat Veteran does love his/her family and is thankful for the many blessings in their life...and they are thankful for you.



I will add the we are grateful for the simple things...for being able to spend time with our loved ones...even if it is in silence. Loud noises and crowds makes us uncomfortable due to the places and things we've experienced. Some of us moved to a different country to provide for our family...we miss the ones we left behind...but above all we are grateful for being safely back.

MICAH JONES, MEMBER OF VFW POST 10076 AND K-9 VETERAN SUMMER AWARDED 2019 ACE AWARD

It didn't take Sergeant Micah Jones long to warm up to E-6 Marine Staff Sergeant Summer in 2014. In fact, it was love at first sight for both of these military veterans when they set eyes on each other for the first time at Dulles International Airport on a cold December night.

The rapport and public respect they've garnered since then has been nothing short of astounding. For the last few years, Sgt. Jones and K-9 Summer, a Labrador Retriever and Explosives Detection Dog, have helped maintain safety at Washington Union Station in D.C. and on Amtrak trains traveling to Baltimore and Alexandria, Virginia.

In recognition of their service, Summer and Jones have been named winners of the 2019 AKC Humane Fund Award For Canine Excellence (ACE) in the "Uniformed Service K-9" category. The pair was recognized at the AKC National Championship presented by Royal Canin in Orlando, Florida, this past December.

"It seemed like a natural fit from the start," says Jones, an Air Force veteran who was on active duty from 1994-2000. Deployed in South America, Japan, Europe, and Afghanistan, working with military dogs at each stop.

Jones was first hired by the Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority Police Department in 2003. He

became involved in K-9 work for a short time before being activated by the Air Force Reserve and deployed abroad. In 2004, prior to deployment, he was paired with Blecky, a German Shepherd Dog, at Lackland Air Force Base, where all military dogs are trained. Following that assignment, the two were reunited in late 2008 and worked together with the Amtrak Police Department until 2013.

The 9-year-old yellow Lab has put her life on the line, too. Summer served in Afghanistan in 2012, searching for and identifying explosive devices and weapons caches. She also swept and cleared routes for the troops and was involved in firefights with insurgents. This war-zone exposure ultimately led to a diagnosis of canine PTSD and eventual reassignment. Around the same time, Blecky was nearing retirement, and Jones began to file paperwork for a replacement. Looking at Summer, there's no mistaking the loyal Lab as anything other than a working dog. Her harness consists of a full array of military decor, including an Afghanistan Campaign Ribbon, Global War on Terrorism Service Ribbon and GWOT Expeditionary Ribbon. She also bears patches signifying "retired military working dog", "Amtrak K-9 Police", and "Do Not Pet". The latter is due to policy to prevent people from approaching her while she works.

Congratulations to Comrade Jones and Staff Sergeant Summer.

Keep in mind, that sometimes our membership, for whatever reason, may not communicate with us that they are in need of help with paying their membership. It is my belief in a time when many of us have to decide whether to buy their medicine or pay their dues. Medicine and other obligations will probably win out. - Remind your members they will have to rejoin if membership dues are not received; causing them to loose their continuous year status.
- Remind members of the many benefits of our membership (example Cancer Grant).



Section 104—Members in Good Standing

- The membership year of the Auxiliary if from January 1 to December 31.
 - A member who has paid their dues to December 31 is in good standing.
 - A member ceases to be in good standing on January 1 immediately following the year for which dues have been paid.
 - A member shall not again be in good standing until their dues have been paid for the current year.
 - Dues must be paid by June 30 to remain a continuous member.
 - Prior year's dues may not be paid after July 1.
 - Any member who has not maintained continuous membership shall submit an application and be accepted in the same manner as a new member.
 - No admission fee shall be required.
 - Continuous membership begins again upon payment of dues.
 - Date of rejoin starts new continuous membership timeline.
